Film Logline

A young North Korean defector's path towards self-discovery brings him into Seoul's vibrant gay community where new friendships and hardships lie ahead.

Film Description

For Cheol-jun, experiences life in two halves. As a North Korean defector living in Seoul, he is part of a small group who have followed a similar path to freedom. He has become close friends with many, but he conceals the fact that he is gay from them. Contending with feelings of isolation and longing for deeper connection, Cheol-jun summons the courage to explore Seoul's vibrant gay community. Finally, able to let his guard down, his life begins to blossom. But keeping his two worlds apart becomes increasingly unsustainable, and Cheol-jun finds himself in a precarious position that threatens the delicate relationships that he holds dear. In this auspicious and achingly tender debut, director Joonho Park perceptively navigates two of South Korea's most marginalized communities with a deep level of nuance, specificity, and compassion towards those yearning for acceptance and understanding. —Jordan Klein

Join us as we pay tribute to director, writer, and producer Chris Columbus with a conversation celebrating his achievements and a special 35 mm screening of his 2005 musical drama Rent.

Film Logline

Director Chris Columbus reunites most of the original Broadway cast for this vibrant adaptation of Jonathan Larson's Tony-winning musical about young bohemians sharing dreams and heartaches in 1990s New York.

Film Description

Anthony Rapp, Idina Menzel, and Tony winner Wilson Jermaine Heredia are among the original Broadway cast that reunite for director Chris Columbus' vibrant

adaptation of Jonathan Larson's Pulitzer Prize-winning musical. Inspired by Giacomo Puccini's opera La Bohème, HIV/AIDS replaces tuberculosis as the disease raging in New York's Alphabet City as 1989 draws to a close. Filmmaker Mark (Rapp) documents his and his friends' lives, poor bohemians all, as they share their dreams and heartaches. While performance artist Maureen (Menzel) makes shows illuminating the group's eviction fight with their former friend and landlord Benny (Taye Diggs), HIV-positive couples Angel (Heredia) and Collins (Jesse L. Martin) and Roger (Adam Pascal) and Mimi (Rosaria Dawson) struggle to maintain their health. Columbus reaps big dividends with striking cinematography and production design that vividly evoke the grit and glamour of the era, while the staging and choreography gloriously open the story from its stage-bound roots. There is also a local angle: While set in Manhattan, the film was largely shot in soundstages on Treasure Island and at other Bay Area locations. —Pam Grady

Danielle Deadwyler (Till) stars as a woman determined to protect her family and her farm in this pulse-pounding, post-apocalyptic thriller. After a mass die-off kills most animals, humans succumb to worldwide famine. For the few people left, viable acreage is a precious commodity. Hailey Freeman (Deadwyler) has that with the farm that's been in her family for generations. An electric fence, video surveillance, and an arsenal act as safety measures but then Hailey's teenage son Emanual (Kataem O'Connor) brings in an outsider. At a time when brutal, cannibalistic bandits are on the prowl, that rash act invites trouble. Deadwyler is pitch perfect as a lethal helicopter mom, well supported by a cast that includes Michael Greyeyes (Fear the Walking Dead) as Hailey's tranquil partner Galen. Music video director R.T. Thorne makes a dazzling, unrelentingly tense feature debut with an indelible drama that blends scenes of everyday domesticity with bloody scenes of carnage.

An epic drama spanning three generations in the life of a Palestinian family, this dynamic film centers the story in the personal while also depicting the dehumanizing political situation surrounding its characters.

Film Description

An epic drama spanning three generations and over 70 years in the life of a Palestinian family, this dynamic and heart-wrenching film centers the story in the personal while also depicting the dehumanizing political situation surrounding its characters. The narrative begins in 1988 in the Occupied West Bank where Salim (Saleh Bakri, The Teacher, Festival 2024) lives with his wife Hanan (co-writer/director Cherien Dabis) and son Noor. The boy, increasingly rebellious against what he sees as his dad's inaction, takes to the streets to protest the occupation, where something happens that will change the course of the family's life. As a lengthy flashback explains how events that occurred in 1948 shaped Salim's diffident personality, the narrative relays a textured story of a husband and father who becomes despondent in the face of constant oppression. With powerful performances and a propulsive narrative, All That's Left of You is a stirring representation of survival amid intergenerational trauma. —Rod Armstrong

The Babadook

In Jennifer Kent's wicked cult classic, things go bump in the night when a widowed single mother's grief gradually grows into something monstrous.

Film Description

Amelia (Essie Davis, True History of the Kelly Gang) is not alright. Still consumed by grief six years after losing her husband in a car crash, she is also overburdened by her son Samuel's (Noah Wiseman) eccentricities and his conviction that a dark and mysterious character from one of his picture books has come to life. When chaos erupts in their lives, the six-year-old blames the book's trench coat-shrouded, top hat-wearing figure. Initially dismissive of her son's delirium, Amelia eventually comes to realize that the monstrous force known as The Babadook represents a terrifyingly real threat. More than a decade after its release, Jennifer Kent's (The Nightingale, Festival 2019) stunning directorial debut continues to haunt audiences the world over, earning a rabid fanbase that crosses boundaries into the pop culture sphere. With a spellbinding performance from Davis and adorned with a wickedly stylish expressionist aesthetic, The Babadook

remains an enduringly demonic delicacy for fans of horror cinema to feast upon. —Jordan Klein

A Colombian immigrant woman in Panama cares for a matriarch suffering from dementia in a powerful story about love, motherhood, and aging.

Film Description

In director Ana Endara's powerful narrative feature debut a pregnant Colombian woman arrives in Panama City desperate for work as she copes with her precarious immigration status. Ana Maria (Jenny Navarrete) finds a job as a caregiver for aging matriarch Mercedes (Paulina Garcia), who is in the early stages of dementia. Patient and kind with the older woman, they form a sweet bond which fuels this tender tale. Navarrete and Garcia share remarkable chemistry, their masterful performances revealing a deepening connection between Ana Marie and Mercedes that allows both to evolve into stronger women. Nicolás Wong Díaz's gorgeous cinematography captures Panama City's lush environment along with the warmth between these very different women amidst great change in their respective lives. —Kristal Sotomayor

The Best Mother in the World

Film Logline

A trash collector fleeing abuse tells her kids that they are on a grand adventure instead of admitting they are homeless in this compassionate portrait of a mom making the best of a dire situation.

Film Description

Filmmaker Anna Muylaert (The Second Mother, Festival 2015) is known for her empathetic portraits of Brazilian women working hard to provide for their families and improve their own personal circumstances. In her latest film, trash collector Gal (Shirley Cruz) flees an abusive relationship and takes to the streets with her two kids and the pushcart that is her livelihood. Pretending they are on a grand adventure in the streets of São Paulo rather than confront her children with the reality of being homeless, Gal attempts to bring a spirit of playfulness to a dire

situation. Muylaert brings her characteristic compassion to the fore, heightened by Cruz's textured performance that blends the levity of the family splashing around in a public fountain with the pathos of a middle-aged woman facing a difficult path ahead. Actor-musician Seu Jorge is similarly memorable as the brutish Leandro.

Distinguished filmmaker and multimedia artist Kahlil Joseph returns to SFFILM with this sonic and visually immersive celebration of black culture deftly crafted by an artist at his zenith.

Film Description

Distinguished filmmaker, music video director, and multimedia artist Kahlil Joseph returns to SFFILM with his first feature. Building on An Evening with Kahlil Joseph (Festival 2019) and his stated intent to present Black stories outside the constraints of traditional media narratives, BLKNWS: Terms & Conditions takes us on an Afrofuturist oceanliner back to Africa. The Nautica is a beautiful vessel full of music, art installations, and welcoming spaces that encourages passengers to reconcile their personal history within a broader cultural context. Sarah (Shaunette Renée Wilson), an undercover journalists, leads the audience a with reportings of activities aboard the ship. Her observations are punctuated by work from artists like Senga Nengudi, Garrett Bradley, Raven Jackson, Ja'Tovia Gary, and Alex Bell. Joseph employs his remarkable versatility to seamlessly weave together archival footage, YouTube and social media content, personal memoir, historical references, and more to offer a kaleidoscopic exploration of the Black experience. This sonic and visually immersive essayistic blend of documentary and fiction is difficult to categorize and not to be missed. A celebration of Black culture deftly crafted by an artist at his zenith. —Jessie Fairbanks

Blue Road: The Edna O'Brian Story

Film Description

No wallflower, literary sensation Edna O'Brien's sexually explicit novels enthralled readers for decades; simultaneously inspiring generations of writers while infuriating power brokers who banned her books. Ignoring prevailing norms of puritan proprietary, O'Brien was renowned for her wild parties, lavish lifestyle, passionate affairs, and most notably, her radiant voice. A trailblazer who bucked convention until her passing in 2024, O'Brien was the ultimate maverick. Her life, both the bitter and the sweet, is captured in this beautifully compiled film. Director Sinéad O'Shea blends diary entries (read by Jessie Buckley), footage of O'Brien with luminaries such as Paul McCartney, Sean Connery, and Jane Fonda, as well as exclusive late life interviews with the scribe herself. Frank and funny, this documentary will lift your spirits and return you to O'Brien's wondrous writing.

Film Logline

In the sun-drenched valleys of Xinjiang, China, a young Kazakh boy, beguiled by the natural world, experiences that same sense of enchantment when he meets a spirited Han Chinese girl.

Film Description

The wind bellows and glides across golden blades of grass in the sun-drenched valleys of Xinjiang, on the northern border between Kazakhstan and China. Arsin is a young Kazakh boy with a deep passion for the flora and fauna around him, giving keen attention to plants and all of their beguiling details. When he meets Meiyu, a spirited Han Chinese girl, she evokes the same feelings of enchantment that he experiences with the botanical beauty that surrounds him. What unfolds between Arsin and Meiyu is a magical-realist fantasy that speaks volumes about our ephemeral and ethereal ties to our wondrous world. In his directorial debut, Jing Yi engages a cast of non-actors and a real-world setting to produce a spellbinding representation of a forgotten land and its people, whose deep connection with nature offers meaningful lessons to live by. —Jordan Klein

The Brink of Dreams

Film Logline

In a conservative Egyptian village, a group of girls form a street theater troupe, using performance to challenge patriarchal norms, pursue their artistic dreams, and navigate the complexities of womanhood and societal expectations.

Film Description

Young women in a remote Egyptian village form a street theater troupe that uses performance as both a creative outlet and a bold act of defiance in this striking documentary. Through their plays, they challenge patriarchal norms, confront sexual violence and oppression, and question the long-held beliefs of their community. But dreams of becoming actors, dancers, and singers collide with reality in the face of resistance from family and friends. Majda's brother ridicules her ambitions, while Haidi's marriage forces her to reconsider her aspirations. Filmed over four years, directors Nada Riyadh and Ayman El Amir capture the women's journey from adolescence to adulthood, revealing the complexities of growing up in a conservative society. As fact and fiction blur onstage, Brink of Dreams becomes a moving portrait of female solidarity, artistic rebellion, and the unyielding pursuit of self-expression against all odds. —Amir George

Cactus Pears

Film Logline

A tender tale of queer love and friendship blossoms amidst one man's grief over the death of his father and the strict social mores of a rugged western Indian town.

Film Description

When his father dies, Anand returns from Mumbai to his rugged western Indian hometown to mourn. Surrounded by demanding relatives and frustrated by stifling rituals, Ananda finds respite from the claustrophobia when he reconnects with childhood friend Balya. In a conservative society that struggles to accept these men's authentic selves, their feelings deepen, with the pair forming a tender relationship that blossoms like vivid cactus pears in the dusty desert. Writer/director Rohan Kanawade makes an auspicious feature debut with this erotic drama, deftly situating this tale of queer love—stories so often told within the boundaries of higher caste and class—in everyday rural India and lower middle-class Mumbai. —Bedatri Choudhury

Carnival of Souls

Film Logline

In this timeless progenitor of low-budget horror cinema, a woman survives a devastating car accident and begins seeing paranormal visions of ghoulish men who pursue her to the ends of the earth and her sanity.

Film Description

After miraculously surviving a devastating car accident, Mary (Candace Hilligoss), an organist, relocates to Salt Lake City to continue her career. But soon terrifying visions of ghoulish men torment her, relentlessly pursuing her to the ends of the earth—and the ends of her sanity. Herk Harvey's timeless low-budget horror classic received little attention during its initial 1962 release but over the intervening decades it gained new life as it went on to influence and inform artists across generations and artistic mediums. Carnival of Souls' spellbinding atmosphere, nightmarish imagery, and menacing manifestation of the macabre have bewitched artists from Lana Del Rey to Phoebe Bridgers. —Jordan Klein

Chain Reactions

Film Logline

Tobe Hooper's slashtastic classic The Texas Chain Saw Massacre shocked moviegoers upon its 1974 release. 50 years on, Stephen King, Takashi Miike, and others describe its influence and ongoing significance.

Film Description

Japanese horror maestro Takashi Miike remembers that he went to see Chaplin's City Lights when he was 15, but ending up watching The Texas Chain Saw Massacre instead. Today he wonders if he would even be a filmmaker if not for that twist of fate. Novelist Stephen King puts Tobe Hooper's 1974 slashtastic classic in context with his own work and recalls his own association with the director. Australian film critic Alexandra Heller-Nicholas describes her long fascination with the movie and how she relates its terrors to a fire in the Outback. In Alexandre O. Philippe's (78/52) engrossing documentary, these three and others speak to the cultural significance of Hooper's sophomore feature and observe how this low-budget, 16mm gorefest went on to not only captivate a legion of fans but also influence and inspire succeeding generations of filmmakers. —Pam Grady

The Chaplain and the Doctor

Film Logline

An unlikely partnership forms between a chaplain and a physician in an Oakland trauma center, challenging medical biases and redefining compassionate care as they confront personal and professional struggles together.

Film Description

At Highland Hospital, Oakland's level-one trauma center, chaplains and doctors rarely work closely together but in this involving documentary, 80-year-old African American chaplain Betty Clark and white Jewish physician Jessica Zitter are exceptions to that generality. Longtime colleagues in the hospital's Palliative Care unit, the two women forge a deep bond through their shared commitment to compassionate end-of-life care. Trained in medical science and interventions, Dr. Zitter learns from Chaplain Clark's wisdom and perspective, and begins to see the emotional and spiritual aspects of healing. The film explores the systemic barriers that prevent holistic patient care, particularly for communities of color, as well as the personal transformations both women undergo. When Chaplain Clark faces her own health struggles, Dr. Zitter steps in, seeing firsthand the challenges Black patients endure. The Chaplain and The Doctor is a moving testament to care beyond medicine, where healing honors both body and spirit. —Amir George

Cass, a newcomer to San Francisco, finds themselves an unintentional caretaker for an acquaintance's child in this sweet local film about discovery and acceptance.

Film Description

Cass is a newcomer to San Francisco, attempting to find their way in a big city. With rigorous discipline Cass starts to build a new life: renting a studio, saving for the future, and maintaining two gigs as a server and nanny. Reserved and cautious, Cass yearns for connection, so when vivacious Kalli comes barreling into their life, bursting with sex appeal and bravado, Cass quickly lets down their guard. When Kalli suddenly asks Cass to watch her daughter Ari, Cass reluctantly

agrees to the unusual request. Days pass leaving Cass to absorb new responsibilities and unexpected financial obligations while providing a safe space for Ari. Angry and confused by her mother's absence, Ari's reaction triggers unwelcome memories for Cass. Despite their mutual frustrations, Cass and Ari form a unique bond even as their situation spirals out of control. Elena Oxman's tender debut, developed through SFFILM's Artist Development program, speaks to the Bay Area's vibrant and rich communities that can magically lead to new beginnings. With a cast of exciting emerging talents, including Asia Kate Dillon and Ridley Asha Bateman, as well as iconic queer comic Lea DeLaria, Oxman weaves together a passionate story of loss, discovery, and acceptance. —Jessie Fairbanks

Shrouded in the chilling atmosphere that has become a hallmark of his career, horror maestro Kiyoshi Kurosawa crafts yet another eerie tale that reveals the darkest parts of the human condition. Ryosuke Yoshii runs an online reselling operation out of his drab Tokyo apartment, determined to strike it big. Through sheer gumption, his unscrupulous practices pay off, allowing him to move to an ornate home in the countryside where his business continues to expand. But Yoshii's misdeeds eventually catch up with him. A series of unsettling and inexplicable occurrences disrupt his tranquil existence, before the malevolence's true form emerges from the shadows. Kurosawa builds off the themes of his 2001 classic cyber horror Pulse, imbuing his protagonist's plight with a keen awareness of how the digital frontier has infiltrated our lives and become a domain for our most troubling and malicious tendencies. —Jordan Klein

Their intellect and compassion bring a vibrant accessibility to the cycles of treatment and the toll of caregiving. The couple's love and compassion for one another is a refreshing reminder that it is always an option to meet life's toughest moments with grace. And humor! Gibson's wit is on full display throughout the film, daring you not to laugh along with her. Director Ryan White's unique bond and deep respect for his subjects allows the film to unfold with stunning intimacy, as he documents the highs and lows in Gibson's fight for more time. Film Logline

The first female elected to her rural Iranian village's council refuses to follow patriarchal norms despite facing aggressive resistance in this transcendent vérité portrait of an extraordinary woman effecting change.

Film Description

Sara Shahverdi, a brave and independent soul, loves to ride motorcycles, refuses to follow patriarchal norms, and is the first female elected to her rural Iranian village's council. A natural maverick, Shahverdi takes her leadership role seriously, building new parks and increasing access to fuel and electricity for all. These initiatives are cleverly tied to her insistence that the village's women be given greater rights and deeds to their homes, leading to heavy backlash. Spearheaded by her own brother, a fellow council member, Shahverdi faces shocking legal challenges and deepening mistrust from her community. Despite these setbacks, she continues to ride in the desert, improve the lives of others, and finds joy in daily discovery. With a patient eye and unobtrusive presence, co-directors Sara Khaki and Mohammadreza Eyni spent five years documenting the lives of women in Iran. The result is a transcendent vérité portrait of an extraordinary woman effecting change. —Jessie Fairbanks

The Dating Game

In this fascinating documentary, Violet Du Feng (Hidden Letters) looks at the unhappy result of China's one-child policy in a society that prefers sons. Years after the country abolished the dictate, there are 30 million more men than women. Males, especially those of lower social classes, find it almost impossible to secure a wife. In an era of endemic male loneliness amid a hypercompetitive dating market, enter dating coach Hao. He remakes men in his own brash image, an approach that is a mismatch with some of his clients. At the same time, while women may be armed with greater bargaining power in this bizarre social scenario, they also feel burned by it, some choosing to swear off messy human interaction and find fulfillment instead with the perfection of virtual boyfriends. What Du Feng so intriguingly uncovers is a dystopic picture of a society grappling with a rash policy's unintended consequences. —Bedatri Choudhury

Behind on rent, she survives by selling fashion knockoffs with designer labels sewn in until she gets busted. In a "Hail Mary" moment, she auditions for a brand-new reality show and makes the cut! Guided by a producer, played with irrepressible glee by Camila Mendes (Riverdale), to accentuate her quirky charm, Margarita gives her all to "Slay. Serve. Survive." as the show's tagline has it. With sharply delineated characters paying humorous tribute to Popov's own background, Idiotka never misses the chance to both satirize and pay homage to the types of shows where stylish dreamers hope to stake a future in fashion. —Rod Armstrong

Chiwetel Ejiofor began his acting career as a teenager, appearing in National Youth Theatre productions and going on to study at the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art (LAMBDA). He was 19 when he made his screen debut in Steven Spielberg's Amistad (1997). Among his acting accolades are the 2006 Rising Star BAFTA award, an Academy Award® nomination and BAFTA award for best actor for 12 Years a Slave (2013), a Film Independent Spirit Award for best supporting actor for Talk to Me (2007), and a British Independent Film Award for best actor for Dirty Pretty Things (2002), and the organization's 2015 Richard Harris Award. In 2007, he won a best actor Olivier Award for the Donmar Warehouse's production of Othello. His turn to screenwriting and directing began with a pair of shorts, Slapper (2008) and Columbite Tantalite (2013). His first feature, The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind (2019) was awarded the Sundance Film Festival's Alfred P. Sloan Feature Film Prize; an NAACP Image Award for outstanding direction; and the British Independent Film Awards' Douglas Hickox Award.

Mel Novikoff Award

When **Gary Meyer** was seven, he saw Disney's **Lady and the Tramp**, the experience sealing his fate as someone who would spend his life in communion with movies. At 12, he started a screening series in his family's Napa hayloft. After studying film production at San Francisco State University, he found his calling in exhibition. He started at United Artists, where he worked his way up from drive-in second feature booker to head buyer of the company's Northwestern Division. In 1975, he co-founded Repertory Theatres, Inc., which would become Landmark Theatres after merging with another company. While at Landmark, he programmed the U.C. Theatre in Berkeley and the Nuart in Los Angeles. After leaving Landmark, he took over the Balboa Theatre in San Francisco in 2001–2012. In 1998, he joined the Telluride Film Festival as Programming/Marketing Consultant, became the Resident Curator from 1999–2006, and co-director from 2006–2015. A longtime journalist, he founded online magazine Eat Drink Film in 2014 along with an adjacent "EatDrinkFilms Feastival." He recently produced a documentary, **The Art of Eating: The Life of M.F.K. Fisher**.

For over 30 years, the SFFILM Mel Novikoff Award has been given to an individual or institution whose work has enhanced the film-going public's appreciation of world cinema. This year's Mel Novikoff presentation will include **Gary Meyer** in conversation with IndieWire Editor-at-Large **Anne Thompson**, followed by a screening of the 1960 Mexican classic **Macario** and **Jessica Yu's** memorable short **Sour Death Balls**.

Mother (Ellen Burstyn) refuses to leave a couch, which might not be a problem for her youngest child David (Ewan McGregor), except the sofa sits in a defunct furniture store and the owners want her to vacate. That is the set up for writer-director Niclas Larsson's absurd first feature that explores the ways our families can work our every last nerve. With Mother refusing to budge, David enlists his brother Gruffudd (Rhys Ifans) and sister Linda (Lara Flynn Boyle) to join him in coaxing her home. The three actors' wildly incongruous accents hint at children raised apart from one another and help explain the overall sense of estrangement—though not how Mother wandered into the store in the first place. 91-year-old Burstyn is marvelous in this film full of droll laughs as the recalcitrant matriarch, receiving excellent support from a cast that also includes Lake Bell, Taylor Russell, and F. Murray Abraham.

Persistence of Vision Award: Johan Grimonprez + "Soundtrack for a Coup d'Etat"

Persistence of Vision Award

Who owns our imagination in a world of existential vertigo where truth has become a shipwrecked refugee? Is it the storyteller who can contain contradictions, who can slip between the languages we have been given to become a time-traveler of the imagination? **Johan Grimonprez's** critically acclaimed work dances on the borders of theory and practice, between art and cinema, going beyond the dualisms of documentary and fiction, other and self, mind and brain to weave new pathways in how we perceive our realities. Our histories and memories are not only a means to reimagine our contested past, but

also tools to negotiate our shared present. In Wonderland, the Queen rephrases it to Alice: "It's a poor sort of memory that only works backwards."

Persistence of Vision Award

Established in 1997, the **Persistence of Vision Award** honors the achievement of a filmmaker whose main body of work falls outside the realm of narrative feature filmmaking each year. This year, the award goes to Belgian filmmaker and multimedia artist **Johan Grimonprez**.

Soundtrack for a Coup d'Etat

What is the first step a country might take when engineering its first post-colonial African coup? Weaponize music and appoint a jazz ambassador. The stylings of Louis Armstrong, Dizzy Gillespie, Abbey Lincoln, Max Roach, and more form a backbeat in **Johan Grimonprez's** (dial H-I-S-T-O-R-Y, 1997 New Visions GGA; **Shadow World**, Festival 2016) rich essay that interweaves interviews, archival footage, and more to tell the story of Western nations conspiring against the nascent Democratic Republic of the Congo in order to protect capitalist interests. Featuring a Who's Who of midcentury international players, the documentary depicts how the US, Belgium, and other Western interests plotted first a coup and then the assassination of Patrice Lumumba, Congo's first prime minister. The film allows the viewer to connect the dots and make connections, holding a mirror to our own era as it harks back to a violent historical chapter written to serve colonizers and capitalists—all of it set to the soundtrack of cool jazz.

Jazz becomes a successful smokescreen for the US and its allies' efforts as well-meaning musicians' diplomatic missions offer cover for a conspiracy to stage a coup against the Democratic Republic of the Congo Prime Minister Patrice Lumumba.

Vowing to bring the perpetrators to justice, Thelma sets out on an odyssey across an evocatively lensed Los Angeles landscape, accompanied by her old friend Ben (a scene-stealing **Richard Roundtree** in his final performance). Together, the determined duo wield their charm, social invisibility, and elder-age devices to overcome numerous obstacles. Director **James Margolin** overtly and subtly draws on action-hero genre cliches, playing with traditional set-ups to illustrate Thelma's agency while also placing Tom Cruise and **Mission: Impossible** directly into the plot. Margolin is firmly at the helm of this hilarious romp but the film belongs to

Squibb, as the Oscar®-nominated performer imbues Thelma with a hunger to be seen and understood by those who love her most, something we never grow out of.

"This is a film about a path," says director **Oskar Alegría** (**Zumiriki**, Festival 2020 and 21) near the opening of this playful and poetic documentary about disappearing practices, among other wide-ranging concerns. The journey begins with his father's ancient Super 8 camera that, surprisingly, still works though it no longer records sound. Needing to make every moment count—a reel is only a little over three minutes long—Alegría brings this camera on a scenic shepherding route traversed by his grandfather, accompanied by an elegant and unforgettable donkey named Paolo. Armed with this antique machine and alongside this equable equine, the filmmaker pays glorious attention to the natural beauty of rural Spain with a discerning and often wryly amusing eye. And, as each celluloid reel fades to black, his equally lyrical voiceover muses on light, history, old traditions, and capturing voices from the past.
